Meet Dana George Hadley: (1832-1924)

Dana was the 4th great grandson of our patriarch, George. Dana <http://www.hadleygenealogy.net/ghtout/gp7850.html> was born in Laconia, New Hampshire, the oldest of three children born to Richard and Rachael (Williams) Hadley. He married Harriet M. Pickering (ca. 1837-1906) and they also had three children; Anna, Dana (Jr), and Emma.

Dana (Jr). *Editor's Note: No record has yet been found as of Feb 2015 that Dana was actually a Jr. The addition of the Jr. and Sr to their names has been added only to distinguish father from son.*

Dana (Sr) had experience in the hotel business in NH. Due to his heath and that of his wife, in 1890, and acting on the recommendation of their physician, they moved to Henderson County, North Carolina. They both were suffering from “weak Lungs disease” (probably tuberculosis or consumption) and a common remedy was to avoid the harsh winters of NH. While in Henderson, they purchased a tract of land on the “Ridge Road” outside of Henderson. It was here they decided to build the *Summit Hotel*, named for it elevated view along the spine of the Blue Ridge Mountains. The hotel, with its twenty rooms, was a major success thanks to its scenic view, outstanding service and uncompromisingly delicious and generous meals. Behind the hotel they constructed a 100-ft. observation tower which also proved to be a major tourist attraction.

The children of Dana Jr and his wife Harriet were young adults when mom and dad move to North Carolina and were thus left behind in New Hampshire with their own lives. However, Dana Jr. and his wife Abby and their four children did move to North Carolina about 1892. It was here their daughter, Irene Belle Hadley, was born on March of 1894.

Dana Jr. went to work with his dad at the family hotel. Dana Jr. was much liked and popular with the hotel guests and staff. A vexing problem existed for the hotel and its guests – the lack of mail delivery. Dana Sr. and a local merchant petitioned Washington for the rights to establish a post office. Washington agreed with this request and approval was awaiting the naming of this new post office. The hotel employees and guests suggested the town be named after Dana Jr., which it was. And, Dana's new daughter had a birth certificate, one that cites her as one of the very first born in the town of Dana, North Carolina.

Dana Jr. and his entire family soon moved back to New Hampshire, as did mom and dad, after selling their hotel. Sadly, the hotel is no longer standing, having been destroyed by fire.

Today, the town of Dana is a thriving, lovely community of about 3,500 people, where the apple-growing industry has become a major business.
